

Missing cannon ball returned to Hancock

In January 1862, Confederate forces under Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson had captured Bath (Berkeley Springs), Va., as part of his Romney Campaign and were intent to capture Hancock.

Jackson sent a representative to demand the surrender of the town from Union forces or risk being shelled. The town was not surrendered and Jackson opened fire on Hancock for 24 hours.

While there was no loss of life, a number of buildings were damaged by the cannon fire. One such building was the Hancock Presbyterian Church.

One shot from Jackson's cannons atop Orrick's Hill struck the back of the church and the ball became lodged in the brick for many years.

However, the original ball was "liberated" by someone in Hancock years later, said Pastor Terry Martin-Minnich.

In the 1980s, the Hancock Historical Society added a plaque on the front of the church to mark the damage.

"The Church replaced the [the ball] with a substitute in such a way that guaranteed its permanence," Martin-Minnich said in an email.

After so many years missing, the cannon round has finally returned to the Hancock Historical Society

and the Hancock Presbyterian Church.

Martin-Minnich said a couple months ago, a member of the Historical Society was told the family of the person who had originally taken the ball wanted it returned to the Presbyterian Church.

"The Church family and I are pleased to see it returned and restored," Martin-Minnich said. "And appreciate the family for their gift."

During this past Sunday's Pentecost and Memorial Day service focused on the restoration, she added.

Martin-Minnich said she used the story of the cannon-ball as part of her sermon on Sunday, saying the story of the cannon ball brought them together that morning and how it was stolen and returned.

"Then in God's timing it was returned, restored," she said. "Not to glorify war. Not to turn this place into a museum. But to remind us of our story, historically in Hancock and presently at the crossroads of what has been and what God is calling us to become."

The ball will be displayed in the Church School vestibule area and people are welcome to call 301-678-5510 and come by the church to see the artifact.

Town in good standing after 2022 audit

After almost a year since fiscal year 2022 ended, town officials got a look at the audit from that year's budget.

Accountants from Albright Crumbacker Moul & Itell of Hagerstown did the audit. This was the first audit the firm had performed for the Town of Hancock.

Cheryl Dodson told Hancock officials the financials were presented fairly, which means it's a clean opinion.

Dodson said the town has unrestricted net assets of \$4.25 million on June 30, 2022. This was due to the excess of "current year over expenditures."

"So you had a pretty great year by the numbers," she said.

The town's sewer funds had income to cover its operating expenses while the water and sanitary funds fell "a little bit short" as far as operating income, she





said. There were grant revenues and other revenue made up for that, Dodson added.

There were some issues with the new police hires being delayed getting enrolled in pension plan until they had completed the academy.

Dodson said she understood why, but the planning document doesn't allow for that.

According to the rules, the cadets would need to be put into the plan when they are hired and before they enter the academy. This would be as soon as they are on the town's payroll

"I understand you have a vesting schedule, which I think it was just a matter of practicality they were delayed because sometimes they don't graduate from the academy and the you just forfeiting that back out," Dotson said.

Town Manager Mike Faith said if the town contributes to a cadet's pension and they were to quit, the money is still on the plan for the other cadets.

Towpath cyclist stops in Hancock on 31st Great Ride

Jack Tracy loves to stop in Hancock. He did so recently while riding his bicycle on the C&O Canal Towpath. It is his 31st trip riding from Pittsburg to Washington, D.C. 
burg to D.C. is Tracy's favorite ride and he says enthusiastically that the Great

Questions & Answers About Our Environment

Dear EarthTalk:

Is it possible to retrofit an old car with an Electric Vehicle drivetrain?

- Jerry M., via email

It is definitely possible to retrofit an old internal combustion engine car with an electric vehicle (EV) drivetrain, but the process can be complicated and expensive. In fact, it may be cheaper when all is said and done—not to mention easier and quicker—to just buy an EV.

If you're undeterred and want to proceed with a conversion anyway, keep in mind that certain types of cars lend themselves to the process better than others. For starters, older cars that rely on mechanics more than computers are often easier to convert. Another consideration to keep in mind is that it's easier to convert a car with a manual transmission since they use less power and are a lot less complicated than automatic cars. Likewise, lighter vehicles make better candidates for conversions given that less weight translates into greater

The first step in retrofitting an old car with an EV drivetrain is to remove the existing engine and transmission. This requires specialized knowledge and tools, so it's important to find a reputable mechanic or EV retrofitting company to do the job. Once the old engine and transmission are removed, the new EV drivetrain can be installed. This typically includes an electric motor, battery pack, charger, and other components needed to make the car run on electricity. The placement of these components will vary depending on the make and model of the car, and the specific EV drivetrain being used.

One of the biggest challenges in retrofitting an old car with an EV drivetrain is finding the right balance between performance and range. The battery pack needs to be large enough to provide adequate range, but it also needs to be small enough to fit in the car without compromising performance or han dling. This can be a delicate balance, and it often requires custom fabrication and design work.

Another challenge is integrating the new EV drivetrain with the car's existing systems. This includes things like the brakes, steering and suspension, as well as the dashboard and other controls. In some cases, it may be necessary to replace or modify these systems to ensure they work properly with the new EV drivetrain.

Despite the hassle and expense, converting an internal combustion engine car over to electric is a great way to breathe new life into your old ride and reduce its environmental impact. In addition to being more efficient and producing fewer emissions than gasoline-powered cars, EVs also require less maintenance and can save drivers money on fuel costs over the long term. It's also a lot less wasteful to electrify an old clunker and give it years and years of additional use than buying a brand-new EV, which requires the extraction and use of precious resources and lots of new carbon emissions to build

Several companies, including Electric GT, Legacy EV and EV West, now manufacture conversion kits. Even GM and Ford are getting in on the act with the recent release of socalled crate engines that car owners (or their mechanics) can easily swap into the engine bays of corresponding models.

Marylanders should be wary of deceptive online sports betting companies & scams

Maryland Attorney General Anthony G. Brown issued a consumer alert urging Marylanders to always be aware of deceptive online sports betting companies, especially in advance of largescale popular events like the 2023 Preakness.

Companies in Maryland's online sports betting industry, which also operates through mobile apps, have enticed bettors with aggressive marketing, such as so-called "risk-free" bets. However, these enticements often appear more attractive than they actually are. The fine print

negate the promised benefits. Additionally, it's not just enticements and complicated "deals" – which may end up costing consumers more money than they were planning to spend in the first place online gambling is also a target for cybercriminals looking to defraud unsuspect-

ing bettors. Online sports betting allows consumers to place bets through websites or mobile apps for a variety of sporting events. This type of gambling was launched in Maryland in November 2022, and is available through multiple sport betting companies, "sportsbooks." A listing of approved companies can be found here: https://www.md gaming.com/marylandsports-wagering/.

"Deceptive practices and scams have the potential to overshadow the excitement of sports betting and leave Marylanders vulnerable to financial losses," said Attorney General Brown. "I urge all Marylanders to remain vigilant, conduct thorough research, and exercise caution to avoid financial loss due to misleading tactics. We will protect Maryland residents and their hard-earned money from deception by online sports gaming companies."

Attorney General Brown offers the following tips to protect consumers from mis-

may contain limitations that leading information peddled by sportsbook platforms:

• Learn what other users are saying about the platform: Check consumer reviews and ratings with the Better Business Bureau (www.BBB. org). The BBB complaints are often detailed and include responses from the platforms.

• Read the fine print. Especially on all promotions and bonus money.

• Read all the conditions placed by the sportsbooks that may limit how and when bettors are able to cash out their winnings, or if the sportsbook will penalize bettors - such as freezing accounts -for certain activities and strategies the bettor may use on their platform to increase their chances of win-

• Remember that there is no such thing as a completely risk-free bet, or free money, when it comes to gambling, despite what may be implied by a sportsbooks ad.

To protect against fraudulent platforms and scammers looking to steal money and financial and personal information, consumers should follow these tips:

• The internet is flooded with fraudulent sports betting

websites. Make sure that you are using the official websites of established sportsbooks that have been approved by Maryland's Lottery and Gaming Control Agency.

• Ignore online gambling pop-up ads and unsolicited emails, text messages, or social media messages. Even if these look like they are coming from a legitimate sportsbook, they could be linking you to a fraudulent website instead.

• Report suspected scams to our Consumer Protection Division at 410-528-8662 or the Federal Bureau of Investigation at https://tips.fbi.

Online sports betting is prevalent and easier to access, now that it is legal in Maryland. Consumers should not forget that they are gambling with real money and that they can suffer devastating financial losses if their gambling becomes problem-

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





- —Allowing you no time to reconsider your pledge.
- Refusal to answer questions about where your money will go or refusal to mail information about the charity.
- Emotional appeals that make you feel quilty about not donating.
- Bills or invoices sent to you, though you never pledged money to the organization.

How to spot charity scams that solicit donations over the phone:

- Get the exact name of the charity and the fundraiser
- that is calling for the charity. Ask if the caller is being paid by the charity.
- Ask if the charity and the fundraiser are registered
- Find out where and how your donation will be used and what percentage goes directly to carry out the charitable purpose described by the solicitor.

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Fifteen people indicted in prison contraband conspiracy at Roxbury Correctional Institution

Maryland Attorney General Anthony G. Brown announced that 15 people have been indicted in three different prison contraband conspiracies in connection to inmates at Roxbury Correctional Institution (RCI) in Hagerstown, Maryland.

The investigation unveiled a sophisticated criminal network that employed drones, a correctional officer, and a hospital, allowing the distribution of dangerous drugs, including fentanyl, and a wide array of contraband such as cell phones, tools, and other illicit items. This is the second major announcement of multiple indictments in prison contraband smuggling schemes in just the past six weeks.

"Crimes committed behind locked prison gates are as much a threat to our communities as crimes committed in neighborhoods and streets," said Attorney General Brown.

In April 2022, the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS) Intelligence and Investigative Division began an investigation after the recovery of drugs and other contraband smuggled into RCI after an inmate had returned to the facility from a hospital visit.

Working with the Office of the Attorney General, the investigative team uncovered a complex web of conspiracies operating to smuggle drugs and other contraband into RCI by way of an employee, drones, and outside civilians who were recruited over social media.

"Our Intelligence and Investigative team did a great job collecting information to build a strong case that we could present to our partners in the Attorney General's office for prosecution," said Carolyn J. Scruggs, Secretary of the MD Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services.

In one conspiracy, inmate Jose Tapia recruited two civilians via Instagram and paid them to try to fly drones over the RCI fence and drop drugs and other contraband for Tapia to receive and redistribute within RCI.

On September 7, 2022, law enforcement interrupted an attempted drone delivery and arrested Guy Austin and Miya Scott. Investigators also recovered a drone Austin and Scott had crashed the evening prior while attempting to make a delivery. The recovered packages attached to the drones included drugs, tools, cell phones, phone chargers, SIM cards, headphones, and thumb drives. Three individuals are charged in this conspiracy:

Jose Tapia, 36, an RCI Inmate, is charged in a 10-count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy and illegal possession of a telecommunications device in a place of confinement.

Guy Austin, Jr., 30, of Baltimore, Maryland, an outside facilitator for Jose Tapia, is charged in a 60-count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy, possession of controlled dangerous substances with the intent to distribute, and attempt to deliver contraband to a place of confinement.

Miya Scott, 25, of Baltimore, Maryland, an outside facilitator for Jose Tapia, is charged in a 19-count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy.

In the second conspiracy, dietary correctional officer Temille Ashby, a 10-year veteran of DPSCS, smuggled drugs to inmate Jamal Brown, who would then redistribute them within RCI.

As a dietary officer, Ashby would work in the RCI kitchen where inmate Brown was assigned to work.

On November 5, 2022, law enforcement intercepted Ashby when she reported to RCI to work an overtime shift and recovered a bundle of approximately 158 strips of Suboxone, which Ashby had hidden within her body cav-

Suboxone is sold for \$100 a strip inside of prison.

Financial records showed that Ashby had received approximately \$16,132 in payments on Cash App from Brown and his family members. Ashby's normal work location was at Jessup Correctional Institution in Anne Arundel County, but she would occasionally work overtime shifts at RCI. Two individuals are charged in this conspiracy:

Temille Ashby, 33, a dietary correctional officer, is charged in a 14-count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy, possession of controlled dangerous substances with the intent to distribute, and attempt to deliver contraband to a place of confinement.

Jamal Brown, 33, an RCI inmate, is charged in an 8count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy and illegal possession of a telecommunications device in a place of confine-

In the third conspiracy, inmate Akeem Banks was transported from RCI to the University of Maryland Medical Center (UMMC) in Baltimore City for medical treatment.

Friends and family of other RCI inmates would hide bundles of drugs and other contraband within bathrooms at the medical center, which Banks would collect during his visits to the hospital. Banks hid the contraband in his clothing and smuggled the items back to RCI.

Once inside RCI, Banks would give the contraband to other inmates, who would redistribute the items within the facility.

Between April 2022 through August 2022, law enforcement intercepted four packages of drugs and other contraband intended to be smuggled into RCI. The recovered packages included drugs, including fentanyl, cell phones, power adaptors, flash drives, and cigarettes.

Surveillance showed Tracy Williams (an outside facilitator for RCI inmate Jason Butler), and Keith Shuford (an outside facilitator for inmate Deven Matos) hiding packages within the medical cen-

individuals Five charged in this conspiracy:

Akeem Banks, 29, an RCI inmate, is charged in a 40count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy, possession of fentanyl with the intent to distribute, and possession of methamphetamine with the intent to distribute.

Jason Butler, 44, an RCI inmate, is charged in a 6count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy and attempt to possess contraband in a place of confinement.

Tracy Williams, 49, of Brooklyn, Maryland, an outside facilitator for Jason Butler, is charged in a 4-count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy.

Deven Matos, 29, an RCI inmate, is charged in a 6count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy and illegal possession of a telecommunications device in a place of confine-

Keith Shuford, 26, of Waldorf, Maryland, an outside facilitator for Deven Matos, is charged in a 4-count indictment, including charges of contraband conspiracy.

"Illicit controlled substances, like Fentanyl, continue to flood our country at an alarming rate, and no communities or institutions are immune from its devastation, to include this correctional facility in Maryland", mentioned Jarod Forget, Special Agent in Charge of the DEA Washington Division.

Additionally, cell searches within RCI discovered more contraband. Five additional individuals are charged as a result of those cell searches:

Denis Alvarez, 27, an RCI inmate, is charged in a 2count indictment charges of illegal possession of a telecommunications device in a place of confinement and possession of

James Careton, 34, an RCI inmate, is charged in a 5count indictment, including charges of illegal possession of a telecommunications device in a place of confinement and possession of contraband.

Jeffrey Gilmore, 41, an RCI inmate, is charged in a 13-count indictment, including charges of illegal possession of a telecommunications device in a place of confinement and possession of controlled dangerous substance in a place of confinement.

Avery Perry, 31, an RCI inmate, is charged in a 4-count indictment, including charges of illegal possession of a telecommunications device in a place of confinement and possession of contraband.

Deon Warren, 28, an RCI inmate, is charged in a 2count indictment with illegal possession of a telecommunications device in a place of confinement and possession of contraband.

This investigation was led by the Maryland Office of the Attorney General's Organized Crime Unit, the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services, the Washington County Narcotics Task Force, and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration Washington Division.

EPA awards over \$1 million in grants to support water quality monitoring at Mid-Atlantic beaches

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced over \$1 million in grant funding to help protect public health in coastal and Great Lakes beach communities in the Mid-Atlantic Region.

The funding is being awarded to Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and Virginia to assist with water quality monitoring and public notification programs for local beaches.

"So many of us have a rich tradition of spending our summers splashing, swimming, and playing at our favorite beach, which is why it's so important for EPA to help our local part-—Tell our advertisers you ners protect the water at coastal and Great Lakes beaches, read about them in The said EPA Assistant Administrator for Water Radhika Fox. "These grants help Tribes, states, and territories fund programs to test water quality at beaches to ensure it's clean for swimming and boating.'

Under the Beaches Environmental Assessment and Coastal Health (BEACH) Act, eligible states, territories, and tribes use the grant funds to monitor their beaches for bacteria, maintain and operate a public notification system to alert beachgoers. provide technical assistance to communities to assess pollution sources at specific beaches, and report annually to EPA on the results of monitoring and notification actions.

"With summer right around the corner, tens of millions of Americans are making plans to travel to our beautiful beaches in Delaware and around the country," said Senator Carper (DE), Chairman of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee. "Fortunately, EPA is providing states and communities with the tools to ensure the safety of the water at our nation's beaches, which are an integral part of our tourism economy and important ecosystems for wildlife and migratory

Since 2001, EPA has awarded nearly \$216 million nationwide in BEACH Act grants to test beach waters for indicators of illness-causing bacteria and help with public notification



and identification of the problem. This program is essential for protecting the public health of beachgoers across the coun-

Contingent upon their meeting the eligibility requirements, EPA's 2023 BEACH Act grant funding will be allocated to as follows: Delaware - \$223,000; Maryland - \$283,000; Pennsylvania - \$235,000; and Virginia \$291,000.



Newbery Winner's plays helps kids understand history

Laura Amy Schlitz was born and raised in the Baltimore area and graduated from Hereford High School in Parkton. She then attended Goucher College, graduating in 1977 with a degree in aesthetices, a major she designed herself. Her dream was to be an actress, but it didn't work for her so she took a job with the Enoch Pratt Library -Fells Point branch.

There she excelled at telling children's stories, probably because it was similar to acting. Then a friend asked her to write an adaptation of Beauty and the Beast for the Children's Theater Association. Schlitz completed the adaptation in 10 days. The compliments she received for the script turned on a light in her and she realized she was a writer, not an actress.

She credits her family life for giving her the background to write. Her mother stayed at home till she was in the fifth grade, she and her brother, Paul, "had a universe of stuffed animals, and ... gave them all distinct personalities and interactions." Schlitz read constantly. Her mom fed her interest by frequent trips to the library. In fact, the library recognized their family as the one that checked out the most books.

She still fondly remembers reading the Little House series, The Black Stallion, and Beezus and Ramona. In 1991, Schlitz joined the

Park School of Baltimore as librarian for the lower school (Elementary) and began to write. Her first book, A Gypsy at Almack's (1993) sold well. She wrote more books as well as a series of monologues (one-person plays) for Park School students so they could feel what it was like to live in the Middle ages. Each monologue gave the perspective of a child living then, such as a plowboy, shepherdess, a falconer's son, a glassblower's daughter, and a beggar. "I wrote them for the kids to inhabit the characters and better understand the history," Schlitz said.

These monologues became the core of Good Masters! Sweet Ladies! Voices from a Medieval Village which was awarded the 2008 Newbery Medal. Continuing to write, she received a Newbery Honor in 2013 for Spendors and Glooms, and the National Jewish Book Award in 2016 for The Hired Girl.

Needmore Structures bring storage & outdoor furniture choices to Southern Fulton

Jeffry Martin has been selling North Mountain sheds in Waynesboro since 2005 but in the last year the shed business has grown to selling sheds in Needmore.

Martin said the Needmore Structures opened last year as an unmanned business but it became a more manned business once he and his family moved to the Needmore area last September.

Martin said he did sell the sheds while the lot was unmanned as people would call and make appointments.

Martin did say he would be at the shed lot "most of the time" adding the operation is a "one horse affair."

If no one is at the lot when a potential customer arrives. Martin's number is on several signs on the various buildings.

He said people could pick up one of the flyers and give him a call to set up an appointment if he's available.

Martin did ask people not make Sunday appointments but they can still come look at the sheds on the lot.

"That's been working out fairly, fairly decent," Martin said.

He had the idea once settled at the location on Great Cove Road there'd be more set hours, but Martin said he's got other projects keeping him on the go.

Martin is not involved in the manufacturing of the sheds he sells, but is just selling them for North Mountain Structures who builds the sheds.



Needmore Structures is located at 6602 Great Cove Road.

While he is at the lot, he assembles the outdoor furniture that's also sold at Needmore Structures.

Since opening, Martin said business has been "fair" but it is a little more rural as they did in Waynesboro, so they aren't moving as many as they did there.

"There does seem to be a fair amount of interest and it takes a little time to get your business built up," Martin said.

Martin said in Waynesboro, the family had a business that sold mulch, flowers, outdoor furniture and sheds.

Martin said as his daughters started getting married and his church started Fulton branching into County, which is the biggest reason they moved to the Needmore area, the sheds seemed more manageable.

With the mulch business, Martin said you would need to have someone there and have set hours, rain or shine. However, with a business like Needmore Structures, you don't need to be there all the time.

"With sheds, people might come as many as two or three times before they're ready to order," he said.

Because of that, they can go to the shed lot, pick up the literature to take home and eventually make an appointment to place an order.

"I try to get over a lot during the week, but not always," Martin said.

Needmore Structures is located at 6602 Great Cove Road in Needmore. To make an appointment to purchase a shed, call Martin at 717-729-5910.

Martin said there is free delivery within 20 miles of the shed lot, but outside that 20 miles there would be a small delivery fee.

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

Escape to Norway with Washington County Museum of Fine Arts' newest exhibition

There was something about the mountains and breathtaking beauty of Norway that spoke to the soul of Pittsburgh-born artist William H. Singer, Jr.

Washington County Museum of Fine Arts' latest exhibition, "Landscapes and Legends of Norway: William H. Singer & His Contemporaries," celebrates Singer's longtime love affair with the Nordic country. The exhibition runs May 27-September 17.

Before Singer and his wife, Hagerstown native Anna Brugh-Singer, founded the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts in 1931, they had already made Norway their

Selected from the museum's permanent collection, "Landscapes and Legends" captures the spirit and magnificence of Norway's natural beauty.

The exhibition includes paintings, drawings, and prints of Norwegian landscapes, myths, and people by Singer as well as his contemporaries, like Jacob Dooijewaard, Frank Morse-Rummel, and Martin Borgord.

"Landscapes & Legends" explores how these artists responded to nature and Norwegian culture in different ways.

"We're having fun with this show," said Sarah Hall, museum director. "Singer's Norlandscapes delightful, and the Norse legends explored in the work of Frank Morse-Rummel are inspiring our upcoming Viking Day as well as our Little Vikings-themed summer

"This is an opportunity for us to share more of our founder's story as well as to bring out some works that aren't frequently on view because of fragility — Singer's pastels are extremely delicate and sensitive to vibration, so we limit both handling and light exposure. Watercolors like Morse-Rummel's are light sensitive and the rule of thumb is to display them a maximum of 25% of the time," she added.

This exhibition places the artists in their broad cultural and historical context by displaying archival materials, including catalogues, letters, newspaper articles, and photographs. Visitors will have the special opportunity to view some of William Singer's delicately rendered and seldomseen pastels.

Who was William Singer?

Born in 1868 to a prominent Pittsburgh steel family, Singer had an early interest in art and dreamt of becoming a painter. His father was a "Sunday painter," and his grandfather George Singer was a painter and gilder of chairs in Greensburg, Pennsylvania. Although William Singer Sr. wanted his son to follow him into the steel industry, his mother, Hester Harton Singer, encouraged his artistic pursuits.

William, Jr. eventually worked in the family business for 11 years. When he met Norwegian artist Martin Borgord, who was living in Pittsburgh, it reawakened his love of painting. Singer split his time between work and studying with Borgord. It was under Borgord's tutelage that Singer began painting landscapes. In 1895, Singer married Anna Brough, and five years later, he left the family business to focus on his art.

Singer and Norway

After spending a year painting in Maine, he and his new bride sailed to Europe where he studied for several months at the Academie Julian in Paris. They moved to Laren, Holland, not far from Amsterdam, where a regional school of artists flourished. It was Borgord who suggested they move to Norway

During World War I, the couple began spending summers on the west coast of Norway and settled near the village of Olden on the Nordfjord, north of Bergen.

Singer captured the spirit and magnificence of this land's natural beauty in different seasons and moods in his Impressionist canvases, beautifully rendered in his Pointillist technique (characterized by dotted brushstrokes and stippled coloration).

Norway spoke to Singer like no other place. He captured the soaring mountains, the tall and stately Norwegian pines, the babbling brooks, and the peaceful Norwegian winters.

Among the exhibition's highlights is Singer's "Our River in Summer" (1924), a majestic view in which the water in the foreground rushes towards the viewer, transporting us to this cool, refreshing mountainside. Like many of the painter's other canvases, this work conveys a mood of contemplation and reverie, and captures an ephemeral moment or impression derived from na-

The exhibition also features a selection of Singer's delicately rendered and seldom seen pastels as well as Morse-Rummel's imaginative watercolors of Norse legends.

Paintings such as "The Battle Between the Ases and the Wanes (Æsir and the Vanir)" make extensive use of freeflowing brush strokes and broad swaths of color that seamlessly merge figures and landscape in evocative, ethereal settings.

For example, Morse-Rummel represented a single deity (likely Odin, ruler god of death, wisdom, and poetry) grasping a spear and swirling through the air as he looks down at the barren earth. In Norse mythology, this battle was a significant conflict between two groups of gods (the Æsir and the Vanir) that ultimately resulted in their unification into a single pantheon.

The Singer's enjoyed the Nordic lifestyle and built a stately mansion in Olden. They shared their wealth with the people of the fishing village. They remained there through World War II, and when the Nazis invaded Olden, its townspeople protected the Singers.

Unfortunately, William While living in Olden, Singer did not live to see a

Nazi-free Norway. He died of a heart attack in 1943, two vears before Norway was liberated by the Allied forces.

"Landscapes and Legends of Norway: William Singer & His Contemporaries" is organized by the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts from its permanent collection. Generous support for this exhibition has been provided by James & Melinda Marsden and Paul & Lotta Mellott.
